2024 ISME Impact Report:

Advancing Music Education Worldwide





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Executive Summary

In 2024, the International Society for Music Education (ISME) strengthened its global community, uniting educators, researchers, and advocates to advance music education. The 36th World Conference in Helsinki welcomed 1,400 delegates from over 80 countries and regions, exploring sustainability in music education. We awarded \$97,000 to support innovative projects, including Parsons Music Advocacy Awards and travel assistance. Our journals, IJME and RIEM, saw over 200,000 downloads and received submissions from 20+ countries and regions, affirming ISME's scholarly impact. Digitally, we grew to 11,144 social media followers—a 19.7% increase—while www.isme.org reached 178 nations. With expanding membership, including a vibrant student cohort, ISME is poised for the 2026 Montréal conference. Together, we are transforming lives through music.

Founded in 1953 under UNESCO, International Society for Music Education (ISME) connects music educators across 90+ countries and regions, fostering collaboration and innovation. Our mission is to enhance music education worldwide through advocacy, research, and equitable access.

The International Society for Music Education (ISME) believes that lived experiences of music, in all their many aspects, are a vital part of the life of all people. ISME's mission is to enhance those experiences by:

- Building and maintaining a worldwide community of music educators characterized by mutual respect and support
- Fostering global intercultural understanding and cooperation among the world's music educators
- Promoting music education for people of all ages in all relevant contexts throughout the world

ISME Core Values

To build and maintain a worldwide community of music educators, ISME affirms that:

- There is a need for music education in all cultures
- Effective music education depends on suitably qualified teachers who are respected and compensated properly for their work
- All teacher education curricula should provide skills in and understandings of a selection of both local and international musics
- Formal and informal music education programs should serve the individual needs of all learners, including those with special needs and exceptional competencies
- Music education programs should take as a point of departure the existence of a wide variety of musics, all of which are worthy of understanding and study

With respect to international and intercultural understandings and cooperation, ISME believes that:

- The richness and diversity of the world's music provides opportunities for intercultural learning and international understanding, cooperation and peace
- In music education everywhere, respect for all kinds of music should be acknowledged and valued

In its promotion of music education worldwide, ISME maintains that:

- Access for all people to music learning opportunities and to participate actively in various aspects of music is essential for the wellbeing of the individual and Society
- In teaching the musics of the world, the integrity and heritage of each music and its history should be fully respected
- Access to music, information about music, and opportunities to develop musical and related skills can
 occur in a range of ways, that are essential in satisfying peoples' diverse musical needs, interests, and
 capacities



Global Impact Through Awards

In 2024, ISME distributed \$97,000 USD to empower music education globally, breaking barriers and fostering opportunity.

70th Anniversary Songwriting Awards (\$2000):

Sponsored by JW Pepper, 4 original compositions were chosen as winners with each receiving \$500.

Travel Awards (\$20,000):

With assistance from SEMPRE, we supported 20 educators to attend the Helsinki conference, enriching global dialogue.

Regional Conference Awards (\$25,000):

Each of ISME's five regions received \$5,000, enhancing local collaboration.

These initiatives reflect ISME's commitment to equity and innovation, amplifying music's reach.


Parsons Music Advocacy Awards (\$50,000):

With Parsons Music Group, ISME provided ten \$5,000 awards to projects in underserved communities. Highlights:

- **Uganda**: Dr. Lawrence Sekalegga's "Give Me a Chance to Sing" brought voice clinics to schools, inspiring policy change. "This award transformed my students' futures," he shared.
- **Cyprus**: Maria Kramvi's drumming concerts integrated migrant students, combating racism through music.




ISME's journals advanced music education research, reaching a global audience.

- Impact Factor: 1.3 (2023).








Revista Internacional de Educación Musical (RIEM):

Online Engagement

Expanding Access and Community in 2024

In 2024, ISME deepened its global community-building efforts through a suite of dynamic online programs. The ISME Café series continued to offer informal, topic-driven virtual gatherings, bringing together members from around the world to exchange ideas, spotlight projects, and foster peer-to-peer learning. The ISME Student Forum grew in both visibility and participation, providing a platform for emerging music educators to lead conversations, develop leadership skills, and connect with international mentors. Most notably, ISME launched the "Our Stories, Our Members" podcast—a video series available via YouTube—featuring intimate interviews with members across diverse regions and roles. These digital initiatives reflect ISME's commitment to inclusive engagement, accessible professional development, and the amplification of member voices year-round.
